BUSHWALKING GROUP

Margaret Farrar has been leading the Ararat U3A bush walking group for the last twelve years. The group which usually focuses on bush walks in the Ararat district took a change of direction this month and headed down to Ballarat to walk "The Statues".

The walk entailed walking Sturt Street, Ballarat, from Drummond Street to Grenville Street. The purpose of the walk was to inspect the 25 iconic statues and monuments which have been erected on this strip.

The earliest statue was the Burke and Wills Fountain which was erected in 1867. This memorial is dedicated to the memory of Ballarat son Robert O'Hara Burke and his good mate William John Wills.

Some of the highlights of the walk included the Titanic Memorial Bandstand, Cenotaph, Queen Victoria Fountain and statues of Thomas Moore, Robert Burns, Peter Lalor, Sir Albert Coates and Pompey Elliot.

BERYL RASELLI'S AUDIO BOOK CHOICES



HUDSON FYSH - Hudson Fysh was a decorated World War I hero who not only founded Australia's national airline, Qantas, but steered it for almost half a century from its humble beginnings with two rickety biplanes to the age of the Jumbo jets. More than anyone, Fysh shaped the way that Australians saw the world.

A sad and sickly boy traumatised by his parents' broken marriage, Fysh was a poor student, but the courage and determination he developed playing sport propelled him through his toughest challenges, and they became the foundations of this great Australian life.



SISTERS IN RESISTANCE -



The extraordinary true story of how three women - a fascist's daughter, a German spy, and an American socialite - raced against Hitler's SS to get key evidence into the hands of the Allies. Containing all the detailed twists and turns of a spy thriller, this is the story of three women, each faced with unbearable pressures and weighty moral questions, whose lives were drawn together in one of the most unlikely rescues of World War II.
